Minutes CASCWA Executive Board, January 14, 2000 Monterey, CA

Members present-- Alan Del Simone, Rich Morrison, John Byron, Bill Booth, Lee Wood, Frank Boehler, Rob Gerig, Jerry Hime Betty Folsom, Phil Kauble, Joe Brucia

CASCWA 2000-- Phil Kauble and his staff received great reviews on the CASCWA 2000 publication. The Executive

Committee ordered another 400 to be printed. Most of the second printing will go to big prepaid orders made by districts. The publication and mailing expenses are high. Phil reported that approximately one hundred copies were sent out as duplicated orders, wrong address, old members, etc. This was a \$ 1000 cost that reflects the importance of having accurate mailing labels.

INTERCOM-- Bill Booth needs material for the next INTERCOM no later than February 1, 2000. He reports that he would like hard copies that he can scan. His MAC has difficulty converting from all the different software programs used by others. His address is 2937 E. San Gabriel, Fresno CA. The next issue will be mailed in late February. CASCWA is also planning an August INTERCOM. Bring material for that issue to the State Conference.

MEMBERSHIP-- With CASCWA being fiscal healthy, it was recommended we hire a part-time secretary to keep track of the membership and mailing labels. This person would be an existing CWA secretary that would be paid for the time (evenings/weekends) spent with CASCWA. By being paid, the person should improve the maintenance of accurate membership files. This was agreed by the committee unanimously.

The WEB SITE-- Changes are being made to assure our WEB site is a true resource for CWA personnel. It was agreed to revise the main page to have a direct link to the CASCWA Research Portal. This Research Portal has all up-to-date links that CWA personnel use. It is maintained on the Merced Union High School District server by Joe Brucia. Also new will be INTERCOM ONLINE. This publication will fill in the gaps between regular INTERCOM issues. It will also have inter-active links embedded into the articles. Joe Brucia and Tom Maglioni will coordinate the revisions.

CASPO-- Ellen Thompson provided a written report on CASPO. Although she did not attend the meeting, this was one of her best reports! She was one of three people attending the CASPO Summit." This organization is a coalition of pupil service associations that come together to promote and maintain pupil services. Its role appears to be a duplication of those agencies that make up its membership. Without a large membership or political base, there may not be benefit for CASCWA to participate. It will be researched.

SECTION REPORTS-- The sections are all doing well with workshops and other activities.

STATE CONFERENCE-- Frank Boehler reported on the State Conference. The flyers were reviewed and commented on. They will soon be mailed out. The conference is at Palm Springs on April 26, 27, 28. Also check the WEB site for registration forms and agendas.

TREASURY REPORT-- Jerry Hime presented the income and expenditures. Our balance remains at approximately \$25,000. It was emphasized the reimbursements for CASCWA expenses must be pre-approved by the Executive Board or its president.

The meeting began at 10:00 A.M. and ended at 1:29 P.M.


Delta Sierra Section

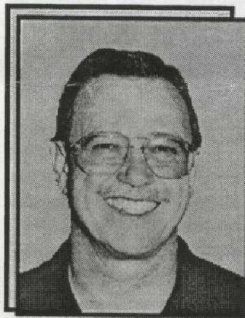

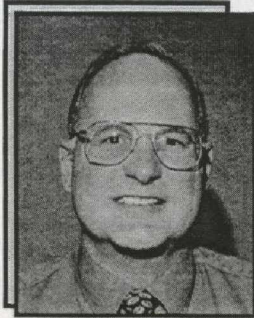

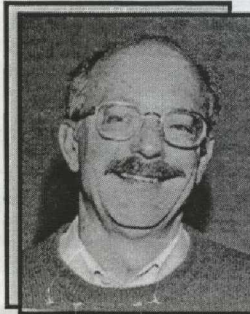
The morning session will have a team from Mental Health, Schools and Law Enforcement, discussing, evaluating and

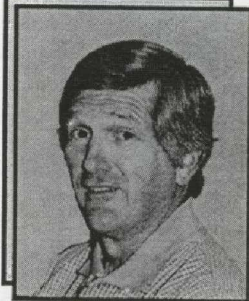

KAUBLE PROVIDES LEGISLATIVE INSIGHTS ...THE FATE OF SB 650

As most of you know, we are now in the second year of a two year legislative session. This is the time that new bills are introduced and old bills, those placed on the shelf (suspense file) at the end of the first session, are dusted off and given a second chance.

Senate Bill (SB) 650 by Betty Karnette, provides an example of the trials and tribulations of a two-year bill.

SB 650, known as the Student Citation Bill, would authorize specified school personnel to cite into juvenile traffic court minors believed to have committed a misdemeanor or infraction on school grounds, as specified. Violations for which students could be cited are:

- Disturbing the peace (fighting);
- Loitering (in accordance with local ordinances);
 - Tobacco offenses;
 - Petty theft; and,
 - Graffiti offenses (use of paint products to deface property).

This bill would further require:

- A MOU between local law enforcement and the schools;
- A training component for site administrators; and,
- A sign-off on all citations by local law enforcement.

The bill was originally heard by the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Senator John Vasconcellos, Chair on April 13, 1999. The bill failed to make it out of committee. As a result, numerous changes were suggested and subsequently the scope of the bill was narrowed.

The following represents some of the arguments against the bill:

- expands the jurisdiction of the informal juvenile traffic court;
- school administrators lack sufficient training in investigation and interviewing;
- lack of sufficient training in report writing;
- lack of knowledge of the elements of crime; and,
- lack of background in the philosophy of the justice system in regard to objectivity, fair play and the seeking of justice.

On January 11, 2000, the bill was again heard by the

Senate Committee on Public Safety. Phil Kauble, representing CASCWA, and Bob Burgess, representing San Leandro Unified School District, testified in support of the bill. The testimony included a number of positive aspects the bill, most of which have already been demonstrated through a similar program that has been operating in the Downey Unified School District. Positive aspects of the bill include:

- reduction in pupil suspensions;
- reduction in expulsions;
- reduction in attendance related offenses; and,
- an increase in actual attendance.

the committee listened to the author and those testifying but expressed confusion over certain components of the bill. Specifically, they voiced concern over the bill's reference to specific violations within Section 256 of the Vehicle Code. Members felt that the bill should reference only those violations for which students could be cited instead of making reference to the laundry list contained in Section 25h.

In short, the committee asked the author to bring back a new bill with clear and precise language. The author agreed

What does this actually mean?

Since SB 650 failed to make it out of committee, the bill (or number) is dead, even though the committee did not officially vote against the bill. Professional lobbyists would say the committee politely killed the bill.

Is there still hope?

Yes and No. The author can still reintroduce the bill (new bill number); however, the process would begin from scratch. That's the difficult part. Yes, SB 650 in new form and new number could resurface, but the reality of that happening this term is, at best, very remote.

To this writer, and to CASCWA, the citation bill has merit and if properly presented, it would have a tremendous impact on the school's ability to address student behavior and school safety.

CASCWA will continue to support the philosophy of the bill and the efforts of Senator Betty Karnette and Stan Hanstad, Director of Pupil Services, Downey Unified School district.

Only time will tell if we are successful.

Proposed Amendments to the CASCWA Constitution

Article III (Organization and Membership)

Section 3

Current: The membership year shall be from June 1 to May 31.

Proposed: The membership year shall be for one year from the date of payment of dues.

Rationale: There is confusion as to what constitutes a membership year. If a member joins at the state conference in April, his/her membership expires on May 31st of that year. By changing the membership year to one year from the date of payment of dues the member is entitled to the benefits for one full year. This will require establishing a membership file that will reflect the date for renewal and a system of notifying the members of such.

Section 4

Current: The fiscal year for the Association shall be the same as the membership year.

Proposed: The fiscal year for the Association shall be concurrent with the terms of office for the regularly elected officers, June 1 through May 31, as provided in Section I, E, 2 of the Association's Bylaws.

Rationale: Amending Section 3 would base the membership year on the date of payment of a member's dues. Each membership would be different and would make it impossible to maintain a fiscal year in this manner.

Article IX, Section 1, requires that for the Constitution to be amended, a majority of the Association's membership must cast a ballot in favor of the amendment.

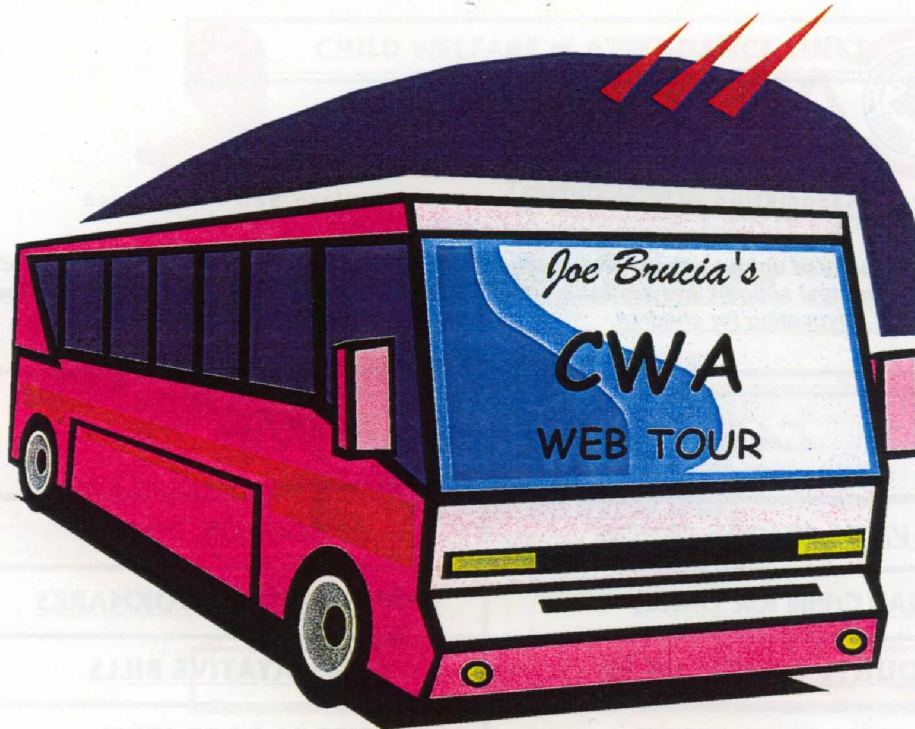
