Alameda County Assistant District Attorneys Teresa Drenick and Tiffany Gipson presented the county's multidisciplinary intervention program for exploited youth and adults- HEAT Watch. HEAT(Human Exploitation and Trafficking) Watch seeks to prevent and combat human trafficking in all of its forms with a five point strategy designed to support victims and those at-risk; engage community members and raise awareness; train law enforcement and other first responders; prosecute traffickers and purchasers; and change legislative policy and identify best practices.

Alameda County Assistant District Attorneys Teresa Drenick and Tiffany Gipson presented the county's innovative program- HEAT Watch.



The afternoon workshop explored restorative practices in schools led by Tyrone Botelho, Executive Synergist & Founder of CircleUp Education. MONDAY APRIL 20 TO WEDNESDAY APRIL 22, 2020

Registration began on September 4th. A cap was set at 350 registrations. On November 12th the 350th registration was recorded.



Unbelievable Registration Activity

CASCWA has a history of successful state conferences and over the past few years the CASCWA state conference has sold out in March and April. We have never experienced the response that took place in 2019. There had been a calculation determining that a cap of 350 registrations would be the limit for the total number of registrants.

Registration began on September 4, 2019. The 350th individual registration was posted on November 12, 2019. As of January 1, 2020 there are 350 registrations posted and a waiting list of over fifty individuals created in order of the time and date entered into our data base. There are two important activities that we would like to share will all who have registered or who have been placed on the waiting list.

First, early in January, Southern Section will be meeting review our calculation used to determine the cap of 350 registrants. This includes the number of presentation rooms, number of seats, additional facility options and other factors. A determination will be made to determine if it is possible and reasonable to increase the number of registrations beyond 350 without compromising the quality of the conference.

Secondly, There is always and issue of individuals who register, do not pay and are no shows. Our conference registration committee will be addressing this issue as follows:

- Our registration committee will be contacting <u>all</u> registrants, in early January, who have not paid or who have not initiated a purchase order.
- A deadline to make payment, or confirm that the purchase order has been initiated, will be set.
- Registrants who fail to respond will be notified that their registration is cancelled and the
 next registrant on the waiting list (based on time and date of registration) will be notified
 and given a reasonable time line to complete payment.

This edition of the Intercom focuses on LACOE's annual legislative update. This is a one day a year event. Sherman Garnett is a force 365 Days a year, 24 hours a day. Sherman is CASCWA's Legislative chair. He works closely with the state and all four section's executive boards. He keeps on top of all legislation pertaining to student services. Sherman is one of the few leaders in our field who regularly testifies in front of legislative committees. Currently, Sherman and Jeni are focusing their attention on an assembly bill that would limit actions that could be taken by a SARB panel:

He has been a successful educator at school site and county office levels. He recently has served on the San Bernardino County Board of Education. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - October 2019

CASCWA Legislative Representative

Listed below is a brief synopsis of current legislation that has been introduced and with minor or no opposition. Please note that each bill listed has received legislative approval out of both the state Senate or Assembly by the legislative deadline and has been signed by the governor for implementation beginning January 1, 2020 unless listed below for a later date. For a full description of each bill, you may access this information at: www.senate.ca.gov or www.senate.ca.gov.

Assembly Bills

- **AB 34**(Ramos)-Commencing with the 2020-2021 school year, require each school district to post **in a prominent section on the district web site policies and procedures involving bullying and** bullying prevention.
- **AB 75 (Education Trailer Bill)** –Multiple requirements including requirement that a charter school shall not require a parent to submit a child's cumulative file prior to enrollment in the charter school.
- **AB 272** (Muratsuchi)-Explicitly authorizes a school district, county office of education and charter school to adopt a policy to limit or prohibit the use by its pupils of smartphones while the pupils are at a school site.
- **AB 413** (Jones-Sawyer) deletes the term "at risk" in the education code and replaces it with the term" at-promise."
- **AB 493** (Gloria)-Commencing with the 2021-2022 school year, each school district, county office of education and charter school to provide online training at least once every two years to teachers in grades 7-12 and all other certificated employees of on school site resources and support of LGBTQ pupils and strategies to support this student population.
- **AB 543**(Smith)- Requires each school site, county office of education and charter school serving any of grades 9-12 to create a poster that notifies pupils of the sexual harassment policy and to prominently and conspicuously display the poster in each bathroom and locker room in addition to notification of the policy to new and continuing students.
- **AB 982** (Holden) Requires public and charter school teachers upon the request of the parent/guardian to provide homework for a student who has been suspended 2 or more school days.
- **AB 1127**(Rivas)-Requires a school district to approve an intradistrict and interdistrict transfer for a victim of an act of bullying.
- **AB 1354** (Gipson)-Requires the county office of education to assign transition oversight responsibilities to the existing county office of education personnel to ensure pupils to have complete and accurate education records when a pupil enters the juvenile court school.
- **AB 1507**(Smith)- Deletes the authority of a charter school to locate outside the geographic boundaries of the school district unless permission has been granted by the school district in which the charter school is physically located.
- **AB 1767**(Ramos)-Requires the governing board that serves pupils in grade 1-6 adopt and update as prescribed a policy on pupil suicide prevention that specifically addresses the needs of high risk groups. The policy must be age appropriate and written to ensure proper coordination and with county mental health for referral to services.

Senate Bills

SB 276 (Pan)-Will require the Department of Public Health to review immunization reports from schools with less than overall immunization rates of 95 percent and physicians and surgeons who submitted five or more medical exemptions in one year and render a decision which may invalidate the exemptions signed by a physician or surgeon.-

SB 316 (Rubio)-Requires all public schools that issue ID cards in grades 6-12 beginning July 1, 2020 to include the telephone number of the National Domestic Violence Hotline on the back of the ID card.

SB 328(Portantino)- Requires middle schools and high schools including charter schools to begin no earlier than 8 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. respectively by July 1,2022 unless the district is a rural school district.



LOS ANGELES COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION'S ANNUAL LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Each December, the Los Angeles County Office of Education's Division of Student Support Services holds a workshop to discuss the revisions to the laws that go into effect on January 1, 2020 (there are a few emergency legislations that took effect earlier.) Dr. Victor Thompson is the Director of Student Support services and we thank him for all that he does to support CASCWA.

BONTA

A (iii)

Membership and Commitment:

- Rather than a symbolic position, pupils on local school boards may be assigned to subcommittees or may decline due to time commitment.
- Alternate pupil member may serve as needed.
- Pupils may be awarded elective course credit.
- Pupil members may attend other functions and events with board.
- Limits the membership in closed session, to maintain privacy and confidentiality.














Guide to Using the Map of Chronic School Absence in California, 2016-2018

To access this guide, download the pdf file and click on "map."

This guide shows you different ways to use, search and filter the map based on questions you may have about the data on chronic absenteeism in California. Below are examples of questions you may have. This pdf guide can show you how to use the map to answer those questions.

What was the chronic absence level for my for 2017-18?

What do chronic absence levels for schools look like within my district or county?

What do chronic absence levels look like for a particular type of school (e.g., elementary) for my district and/or county?

Which schools in my county or district have a certain chronic absence level (e.g., extreme, high or low)?

How has the chronic absence level for my school changed between the 2016-17 school year and the 2017-18 school year?

Editor's Page

If your career is in education, you must sooner or later deal with the death of someone who has been important to you. Grief is personal and necessary.

This editor is always excited and optimistic when the emails come in with articles and information for the next edition of the intercom. This was especially true when I received an email from a special lady. A lady who has dedicated her life to the betterment of children. She has been an active CASCWA member for decades. She is one of the best section and state presidents that we have ever known. Having seen and heard several speeches where she delivers moving positive messages to our scholarship students, I was truly engaged and then I read the following:

" I don't have any articles but am prompted by your request to reflect on the loss of my 23 year old grandson who died under circumstances similar to Tyler Skaggs.

The harsh reality is that people of all ages and income levels increasingly use substances to alter their mood or their mind. State Superintendent Tony Thurmond Announces Free Project Cal-STOP School Safety and Mental Health Crisis Trainings

SACRAMENTO—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond yesterday participated via video conference in a live seminar hosted by the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools to encourage middle and high school local educational agencies (LEAs) throughout the state to take advantage of free school safety and mental health trainings available through the Project Cal-STOP training initiative, a three-year, \$1 million grant funded under the federal STOP School Violence Act.

"Students are returning to the classroom this month and should feel safe stepping onto a school campus," said Thurmond. "These trainings will provide administrators, teachers, students, and the entire school community with violence prevention strategies that could stop a school shooting before it takes place and intervention tools to identify and respond to students who are dealing with a mental health crisis. Schools should be a place where students learn, not a place that students fear."

Sandy Hook Promise (SHP), a national nonprofit led by family members who lost loved ones in the 2012 shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School, is partnering with the California Department of Education (CDE) to implement the Project Cal-STOP trainings. Along with State Superintendent Thurmond and California Department of Education staff, SHP California Region Manager Ilana Israel Samuels participated in the seminar. Samuels said that through a devastating tragedy, SHP has been able to transform schools and communities throughout the country.

The Project Cal-STOP trainings will consist of two parts:


- School violence prevention training modules, part of the *Know the Signs* programs in partnership with SHP, for staff and students.
- Expansion of current CDE Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) training workshops for district and support staff to better assist students dealing with mental health issues.

"There should be no mystery on why mental health and violence prevention trainings are being offered," said Thurmond. "This is just the first of many conversations regarding school safety and the need to get resources that can help students and keep them safe directly to our school communities."

Participation in the trainings is voluntary and available to nearly 200 LEAs throughout the state on a first-come, first-served basis. Due to limited resources, Project Cal-STOP may not be able to accommodate all training requests. To request a training, LEAs can fill out the Project Cal-STOP response form on the CDE website.



THE POWER OF LEADERSHIP

Empowering schools to better help students

onterey, California is home to Pebble
Beach and the backdrop of HBO's hit
Big Little Lies, but Dr. PK Diffenbaugh—Superintendent of Monterey
Peninsula Unified School District—wants
the area to one day be known for having
one of the finest school systems in the
country.

Behind the scenes of the tourist haven are the cooks, and the cleaners, and the restaurant workers who fuel the industry. Those are the families served by Monterey Peninsula USD, where the cost of living is significantly higher than the state average.

"I think a lot of our parents are struggling to get by," explains Dr. Diffenbaugh, noting that the region's reputation of wealth means many assume the district is well off as well. "When you dig a little deeper you see we have the same challenges as other districts throughout the state, and we need to come up with creative solutions."

When Dr. Diffenbaugh took on the role of superintendent in 2014 he was the seventh superintendent in 10 years. There was a significant amount of rebuilding trust, relationships, confidence, and belief in the school system that had to happen, he says. And while there's still a ways to go, Dr. Diffenbaugh is proud of the progress that has already been made.

In the last five years, suspension rates have decreased, college and career pathway offerings have expanded, more children are enrolling in preschool or transitional kindergarten, and now, all elementary students have access to music and art education.

Such results can be at least partially attributed to Dr. Diffenbaugh's approach to affecting positive change by ensuring everyone feels a connection to, and ownership of, their campus.

"Ultimately, a leader needs to empower those around them—it's about making others better as a result of your leadership," Dr. Diffenbaugh says. "I'm trying to empower and create collective ownership around a shared purpose. While I take responsibility for district outcomes, I know I can't manage what happens inside every classroom from the district office."

Collective ownership is important because people are more likely to engage in the difficult work of improving if there is a sense of ownership over that work, he says. And creating the kind of environment where that can happen takes trust.

"I believe in doing what we say and following through, communicating well and transparently—all that leads to building trust," Dr. Diffenbaugh explains. "Trust takes time and consistency, but it's essential to improvement."

Susan Cook, COO and Leadership Coach at School Innovations & Achievement—which recently partnered with Dr. Diffenbaugh to help the district improve student attendance and reduce high rates of chronic absentee-ism—says Dr. Diffenbaugh is successfully creating a culture where everyone is empowered; everyone knows they play an integral role in achieving success.

"Dr. Diffenbaugh communicates a clear, compelling vision that inspires others to want to follow," Cook says. "Great leaders like Dr. Diffenbaugh not only make those around them better, they make those around them better when they aren't in the room."

"We understand we're far from where we need to be, and that we need to continue to improve every day in order to get there," he says. "And I think it takes consistent leadership over time to get the kind of results that we're going for."
